WA Eclipse One Year Countdown Begins



One year from now, Western Australia will be the best place on the planet to witness a total solar eclipse.

On 20 April 2023, the area around Exmouth and the Mackerel Islands will be buzzing with visitors ready to see one of nature's most incredible shows.

Tens of thousands of eclipse chasers are expected to be in Exmouth on WA's North West Cape and in boats around the Mackerel Islands. These places offer the only land in Australia where the "path of totality" crosses and the total solar eclipse will be visible.

The "path of totality" is very narrow at just 40km wide. Those in this area will experience the full awe and wonder of the total solar eclipse, where the Sun is fully blocked by the Moon and the Moon's ominous shadow sweeps over the landscape, plunging the area into darkness for just over one minute.

To experience a total solar eclipse, you must be within the "path of totality" and it's an experience that will live in memories forever.

Anzac Day in Newdegate



Approximately 40 people of all ages attended the Newdegate 2022 Anzac dawn service, to pay their respects to all those who served.

The service was broadcasted by the ABC radio with an address presented by Mr Michael Ruffin, a veteran of Malaya, Borneo and Vietnam. He spoke of one occasion he remembers vividly every Anzac Day and of how lucky he is to be here, after surviving a New Year's Eve patrol in 1968 with the 2nd Squadron, Special Air Service Regiment. He still has a bond with the men he fought beside.

Tim Lloyd had the honour of laying the wreath. Tim was part of the 28th Royal West Australian regiment, doing his training with the citizens military forces in Northam 1968- 1970.

Damon Maynard took pride in raising the flag. Damon's grandfather served with the occupying forces in Japan in WW2 and his great great grandfather served in France during WW1.

A spectacular dawn rose over the newly erected Anzac commemorative memorial, highlighting the bugler and rising sun. This memorial is mounted on a beautifully crafted stone base.

Following the service, the local St John ambulance volunteers and others served up a hearty breakfast, enjoyed by all. A far cry from the horror our Anzacs would have been presented at dawn 107 years ago.







Program to improve heavy vehicle rest areas now underway

- The \$50 million Freight Vehicle Productivity Improvement Program now underway
- Phase 1 includes \$20 million worth of projects to improve heavy vehicle rest areas across 13 locations
- State Government working with transport industry on priority areas for drivers
- Important upgrades to rest area facilities for heavy vehicle industry operators are now underway across 13 locations in Western Australia, as part of the \$50 million Freight Vehicle Productivity Improvement Program.

The \$50 million program, jointly funded by the Commonwealth and State Government, includes improvements that will allow for safer turning movements, improvements to parking and breakdown areas for combination vehicles reducing noise and dust, and the construction of ablution blocks at some locations.

Phase 1 of the program, includes a \$20 million investment across 13 locations in the Pilbara, Mid-West, Wheatbelt, Goldfields and South-West regions.

Work recently commenced at the heavy vehicle rest area in Munjina adjacent to the Auski-Munjina Roadhouse and Accommodation and includes the sealing of the rest of the area and improved access for heavy vehicles.

Work will progressively commence on each of the 13 locations below over the next six months, with all improvements due for completion in late 2022:

Pilbara

Marble Bar Road - Minor rest area improvements, construct ablution block (\$170,000)

Great Northern Highway at Karijini Drive - Upgrade rest area, construct ablution block (\$1.2 million)

Great Northern Highway at Bell Street - Minor Road Train Assembly Area improvements, construct ablution block (\$280,000)

Great Northern Highway, Newman - Construct new Road Train Assembly Area and ablution block (\$12.2 million)

Great Northern Highway, Munjina - Construct new rest area (\$3.4 million)

Great Northern Highway, Redmont - Minor rest area improvements, construct ablution block (\$170,000)

Mid-West and Gascoyne

Great Northern Highway, Wubin - Minor rest area improvements, construct ablution block (\$200,000)

Great Northern Highway 115 kilometres north of Wubin - Minor rest area improvements, construct ablution block (\$200,000)

North West Coastal Highway, Northampton - Minor rest area improvements, construct ablution block (\$200,000)

Minilya Exmouth Road - Minor rest area improvements, construct shower and ablution block (\$400,000)

Wheatbelt

Great Eastern Highway, Northam - Minor Road Train Assembly Area improvements, construct ablution block (\$100,000)

Goldfields Esperance

Main Reef Road (Goldfields Highway), Leonora - Extend Road Train Assembly Area, construct ablution block (\$1.6 million)

South-West

Willinge Drive, Bunbury - Minor Road Train Assembly Area improvements, construct ablution block (\$200,000)

These priority projects were identified through extensive consultation with peak industry groups, including Transport Workers Union (WA Branch), Livestock and Rural Transport Association of WA and Western Roads Federation.

The 2022-23 program is also being developed through consultation with industry and will continue to be developed to ensure the appropriate priority areas for drivers are identified for forward works planning.

"Our freight drivers in WA provide an essential service and are key for delivering critical supplies across the country.

"Our engagement with the transport industry has helped WA achieve outcomes that are often the envy of our Eastern State counterparts and providing these much needed amenities and facilities in regional WA will only make it that much easier for our freight drivers.

"The Heavy Vehicle Industry has advocated for all needs to be addressed in one place creating a 'one stop' approach, and we are delivering these improvements to support road safety and provide greater opportunities for heavy vehicle operators to utilise as part of their fatigue management."

CRIME

Unfortunately, we have had more reports of payment redirection scams, the most recent resulted in the loss of several hundred thousand dollars. This type of scam has become increasing more common and anyone who pays bills or invoices online should be aware of them.

In a payment redirection scam, also known as business email compromise scams, scammers impersonate a business or its employees via email and request that money, which usually is owed to the legitimate business, is sent to a fraudulent account.

“Payment redirection scams impact businesses across many industries, including real estate, construction, law, recruitment, and universities,” ACCC Deputy Chair Delia Rickard said.

Payment redirection scams can take several different forms. In some instances, scammers hack

into a legitimate email account and pose as the business, by intercepting legitimate invoices and amending the bank details before releasing emails to the intended recipients.

In one instance, a victim lost \$16,500 in a single transaction after a scammer used a staff member’s email address to send an invoice to a customer with ‘updated bank details’, redirecting the payment to the scammer’s personal bank account.

Other times, payment redirection is done by spoofing, when scammers impersonate CEOs or other senior managers using a registered email address that is very similar to that of the genuine email address. The scammer will then request that staff transfer funds to them or make a payment to a third party on behalf of the business.

There has also been reports of scammers posing as staff members, where they request the employee’s salary be paid into the scammer’s bank account.

“An increasing number of reports are coming from sports and community clubs which reported more than \$55,000 in losses to payment redirection scams last year” Ms Rickard said.

Scammers posed as the president or treasurer and requested staff to action payments for ‘equipment’ or other business needs, but the money went straight into the scammer’s bank account.

Other businesses or individuals have also inadvertently paid a scammer as a result of a payment redirection scam.

It can be difficult to recover money lost to a payment redirection scam, so prevention is really important. Don't deviate from your organisation's payment procedure, even if the request you have received appears to come from legitimate source.

If you have received a request that creates a sense of urgency, don't rush. Take the time to consider and check whether an email is real, including by looking carefully at the sender's email address, before acting on instructions.

Whenever there is a request to change payment details or you are making a payment for the first time, always check with the organisation using stored contact details, rather than those in the requesting communication.

If you have been the victim of a scam, contact your bank as soon as possible and contact the platform on which you were scammed to inform them of the circumstances.

Grain Brokers Weekly Report

Drought in Brazil adding to corn conundrum...

Drought conditions in Brazil escalated dramatically in April as the La Nina influence intensified, leading to the collapse of this year's monsoon around two weeks earlier than usual. This will seriously impact safrinha corn production, especially in the later planted regions, as yield potential falls due to lack of moisture.

The onset and retreat of the wet season in central Brazil are traditionally quite distinct. Basically, it rains almost every day in the wet season and rarely rains in the dry season. The autumn transition from wet to dry traditionally happens rather swiftly, typically in the first week of May.

The soil moisture profile at the time of seeding the safrinha crop earlier this year was exceptional, with a significant proportion planted ahead of schedule. In Mato Grosso, around 93 per cent of the crop was planted before the ideal seeding window closed at the end of February. This led to a flurry of record safrinha corn production forecasts from both local and global analysts.

However, potential production issues began to emerge as early as mid-March when rainfall intensity declined, and the falls became far more sporadic than normal. That moisture deficit accelerated in April, with precipitation in the first half of the month minimal and then the tap turned off on April 16.

The state of Mato Grosso is facing its driest April in 17 years, according to a recent report issued by weather service EarthDaily Agro. April rainfall for the state is expected to be just 30 millimetres, 70 per cent below the average for the last decade. In the neighbouring states of Goias and Minas Gerais, April rainfall is expected to be just 15 per cent of the ten-year average. The situation in Mato Grosso is very similar to 2016, when the safrinha corn yields finished that season around 30 per cent below average after the dry continued through May and June.

Mato Grosso is Brazil's biggest safrinha corn production state. Production is currently forecast at 40 million metric tonne, 45 per cent of the most recent national safrinha corn production estimate from Conab, the government's food supply and statistics agency. Combined with Goias and Minas Gerais, the three

states produce around 60 per cent of the nation's safrinha corn output.

The below-average rainfall in late March and April has seriously depleted soil moisture levels. Ideally, corn enters the pollination stage with close to a full moisture profile. However, only a small proportion of the crop had that luxury this year and yields on those fields are expected to be above average.

The prognosis for the majority of central Brazil's safrinha corn area is not as rosy. The crop is approaching its peak moisture demand phase, with as much as 40 per cent already suffering a low to moderate level of moisture stress. Coupled with that dryness is the growing threat of frost. There have already been overnight frosts in the higher elevations of southern Brazil. If it stays dry and cold, the possibility of frost impact on safrinha production grows.

Vegetation vigour, measured by the Normalised Difference Vegetation Index (NDVI), is starting to show increasing signs of moisture deficit. This trend is expected to continue as the effects of next to no rain in the second half of April materialise. And there are no significant falls in the ten-day forecast. In fact, it looks dry for the next month.

Brazil is the world's third-largest corn producer after the United States and China. The most recent World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates put total 2021/22 production at 116MMT, around 75 per cent of which will be from the safrinha or second corn crop. In his latest update, crop consultant Dr Michael Cordonnier left his Brazilian corn crop estimate unchanged at 112MMT. In the export stakes, The United States Department of Agriculture has Brazil in second place with 44.5MMT, behind the US with 63.5MMT and just ahead of Argentina on 39MMT.

Brazil's production hiccup comes at a time of heightened demand for South American corn as the war in Ukraine has landlocked as much as 15MMT corn that was destined for the global export market. The issues in Brazil are globally significant as it is the leading global corn supplier between now and the US harvest in the northern hemisphere autumn. Some analysts expect downward production revisions to hit the wires in the next week, with a lower forecast even possible in

this month's WASDE report, due for release on May 12. Surprisingly, markets seem to be more interested in the weather situation and potential new crop planting delays in the US, the slowest since 2013, rather than the tightening of the 2021/22 balance sheet. Nevertheless, prices have certainly reacted to the mounting issues, with nearby Chicago futures closing last week at a ten year high of US\$8.1350 per bushel.


To put that in perspective, the corn price dropped to just over US\$3/bu during the early months of the coronavirus pandemic. In the first four months of 2022, the May futures contract has rallied 37 per cent. There have been 82 trading sessions over that period, with the up days outnumbering the down by a ratio of two to one. In the 31 days from March 29 to April 29, the market was up more than 14.8 per cent, reflecting the growing global supply concerns.

Amid the Ukrainian old crop supply disruptions and the

Brazilian weather woes, China has turned its corn purchasing attention to the US. Asia's biggest corn importer purchased almost 1.1MMT of old and new crop corn in one transaction last week, the fourth flash sale of corn to China exceeding a million metric tonne in April. New crop sales of US corn are almost 5.5MMT, more than 65 per cent higher than at the same time in 2021.

Corn is now well into a demand rationing price regime, but the rally will continue as long as demand is strong, and supply remains uncertain. The global consumer is reeling, caught with inadequate purchases in a rallying market. Global inventories are in a vulnerable state, and the security of cover comes at a high price.

Deep ripping the right soil can pay off this season, despite fuel prices

High fuel prices are not necessarily a reason to hold off deep ripping, according to analysis by the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD).

DPIRD research scientist Bindi Isbister said with recent diesel price hikes and hard soils from a dry summer increasing draft and fuel use, many growers were asking whether it was still worth deep ripping.

“Despite the high cost of fuel, if you are deep ripping a soil type that typically has a good yield response then it is still economically worthwhile,” Ms Isbister said.

“For example, for good sandplain that has a 600 kilogram per hectare wheat yield response, deep ripping is worthwhile. Even at a fuel cost of \$3 per litre, with a wheat price of \$330 per tonne, the additional return from deep ripping is \$28 per hectare in the first year.

“This was based on the estimated cost of deep ripping to 55cm for labour, wages and depreciation of \$62 per hectare and a fuel use of 90 litres per hectare.

“The benefit of deep ripping commonly persists for at least three years, therefore, the cumulative three-year additional return is \$183 per hectare with the ripping cost spread over that time.

“If a minimal yield response is anticipated, for example 400kg per hectare, and the optimal ripping costs are \$132 per hectare at a fuel price of \$2 per litre and wheat price of \$330 per tonne, then the cost of ripping is about the same as the returns from additional yield in the first year.

“In this case, a profitable response is dependent on the residual benefit of ripping in the second and third seasons, so it is higher risk for more limited return.”

Ms Isbister analysed cereal grain yield responses to ripping at two different depths, 30-40cm and 55-60cm, incorporating data from historic and current DPIRD and Grains Research and Development Corporation trials.

“Due to limited summer rainfall in some regions, the soil is very dry and hard so it may not be possible to rip below the hard pan that typically extends to 60cm,” Ms Isbister said.

“Research has shown, particularly in low rainfall regions, if the hard pan is not removed completely due to shallow ripping, there can be a greater risk of the crop haying off early in a dry spring.

“So if you intend to do the job, do it properly and rip deep enough to remove the subsoil compaction layer, or wait for another opportunity.

“Some areas have received good rainfall over the last month and this provides an opportunity to effectively rip and remove those deeper hard pans, on responsive soil types.

“Many growers may be leaving more fallow this year due to the high cost of inputs, so this is a good opportunity to deep rip in spring when soil moisture is at an optimal level to achieve good ripping depth.”

Ms Isbister said where possible, growers should avoid ripping rocky areas that increased the risk of machinery breakages, especially if using the same tractor for seeding.

“It is worthwhile for growers to do their own sums, taking into account the expected soil type response and cost of ripping to the optimum depth,” she said.

RECIPE — Mother's Day Lemon Drizzle Pancakes

Ingredients

200g self-raising flour

1 tsp baking powder

1 tbsp golden caster sugar

½ tsp vanilla extract

200ml milk

3 eggs

25g butter , melted, plus extra for frying

1 lemon , zested

For the toppings

100ml double cream

2 tbsp icing sugar

100g lemon curd

1 lemon , pared zest, plus 1 tbsp juice

Method

Whisk all of the pancake ingredients together in a large bowl until smooth.

Put a small knob of butter in a large non-stick frying pan over a medium-low heat and cook until melted and foaming. Pour 2 tbsp of the mixture into the pan and use the back of the spoon to shape into a 8-9cm round disc. Depending on the size of your pan you may be able to get 2 or 3 pancakes to cook at the same time.

Cook for 2-3 mins on the first side, then flip over and cook for another 1 min on the other.

Heat oven to its lowest setting. Stack the cooked pancakes on a baking tray and keep them warm in the oven while you cook the rest.

Softly beat the double cream with the icing sugar using a whisk, then fold in half of the lemon curd. Mix the remaining curd with enough lemon juice to make it a drizzling consistency.

To serve, stack the pancakes with layers of the whipped cream in between them, drizzle with lemon curd, and scatter with lemon zest to serve.
