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

Sagittarius and the Teapot | 19th August



Time for a cuppa! Can you see a “Teapot” in the night sky? Yes, there’s really a teapot up there! But we haven’t found the kitchen sink yet!

The “Teapot” is what’s known as an asterism rather than a constellation. A constellation is an area of the sky that is officially recognised by the International Astronomical Union. Whereas, an asterism is a pattern of stars that we can use to make up a recognisable shape or object. Some asterisms form part of official constellations.

The “Teapot” asterism is part of the constellation of Sagittarius. In the Southern Hemisphere, Sagittarius appears upside down and so is the “Teapot”. Grab a nice cup of tea, head outside, use the Moon as your guide and try and see if you can see the “Teapot”.

When and where to look: Look directly above at around 8.30pm on 19th August. Look for the bright Moon. Above the brightly illuminated side of the Moon is the handle of the teapot. There is a group of brighter stars that make up the lid and spout too!

Something Interesting

When you look towards the constellation of Sagittarius, you’re looking to the heart of the Milky Way Galaxy. In the Southern Hemisphere the heart of the Milky Way is high overhead. We’re lucky to see it much better here than in the Northern Hemisphere.

GRACE'S GARDENING TIPS?

Pumpkins!

When you first take a look you might think a pumpkin takes up too much room to fit in a veggie patch. But they can grow over a fence, so they don't overtake the whole veggie patch.

Position: Choose a spot with full sun and well-drained soil that has been improved with composted manures. Those with limited space will be happy to hear that pumpkins grow well up and over a fence, trellis, hills hoist or arbour, provided the structure is sturdy enough to support the weight of the fruit.

Growing Guide: Pumpkins are sensitive to frost and should be planted after the last frost. In frost-free climates such as areas close to the Tropic of Capricorn pumpkins can grow year round, though high temperatures, over 30 degrees C can affect fruit formation. Planting by seed is the only option and germination takes place at 20 degrees C, as Vic Newman used to say "plant your pumpkins Close to Newdegate Field Day times" . You can sow directly into the plant's final position or sow in pots inside to get an early start on the season. Press each large seed down about 2cm deep and plant four in a clump, later pulling out the two weakest seedlings. Allow 50cm between clumps. When pumpkins have six leaves pinch out the growing tip to encourage branching. Once the vine reaches 2-3m, pinch out the growing tips again to encourage fruiting. Regular watering is a must throughout the growing season; irregular water will cause the fruit to split.

Pumpkins produce short-lived male and female flowers that can close by mid-morning. Female flowers open above the swollen, distinctive embryo fruit and male flowers produce pollen. Native and honey bees are normally able to complete pollination, but sometimes ants harvest the pollen before this occurs. You can increase the harvest by hand-pollinating: pick male flowers, remove petals then dab pollen on the stigma of female flowers. Squeezing female flowers aids pollination in wet weather.

Harvest: Pumpkins take 70-120 days to mature. The vine dies down, the fruit stalks start to die off and become brittle, and the fruit will often fall off in your hand. Ripe fruits with unbroken skin store very well if kept in a cool, dry, well-ventilated space. They can be kept outside throughout winter, on the shed roof where they can sweeten with the cold weather. Some varieties will keep six months or longer. Good-looking specimens, such as charming little 'Gold Nugget', can be brought inside for table decorations. Seed can be saved from fruit one month after harvesting. Scoop seed from flesh, wash, dry and store in a cool, dry spot away from sunlight. To ensure seed-grown plants are true to type, save seed from one variety grown in isolation.



Well another two weeks seem to have flown by and another news article is upon us already. At the time of writing this article we still have no idea of when Lake Grace Police will be welcoming a new Sergeant, we will of course keep you all informed as and when this happens.

We are trying our best to recruit someone who will fit in the town and its values, and we may have to do a little promotional video to try and 'sell' the town. I personally don't think we should need to do this, but believe it or not, it's quite difficult to get people to make the move. Once they are here, they will love it!

CRIME

Police mainly act on information coming in from the community, or other reasonable suspicion that something untoward is happening. This can be by way of information provided directly to police, or anonymously via crime stoppers. We can't just go entering someone's house because we don't like them or we 'think' they are drug dealers, without that reasonable information. This usually comes from the people in the know....that's YOU!!



If you see or hear of any suspicious activity and you do not want to report it directly to Police, then there is an alternative; You can call CRIME STOPPERS on 1800 333 000, Crime Stoppers is an independent body that allows a person to report a crime anonymously, the report is then vetted

before it is sent to Police, the report source is never revealed to us.

As a result of recent anonymous crime stoppers information, Lake Grace Police recently conducted a Misuse of Drugs Search Warrant at a local private residence. This resulted in prohibited drugs being seized, and a person being charged for possession of a prohibited pant.

When a search warrant is granted to Police it provides us with certain powers when entering someone's home, this includes the right for Police to enter a person's home even if they are not present and police can enter by force if necessary.

LOCAL NEWS

The recent rain appears to have filled most of the dams up to overflowing which is good news for all of those concerned, although we are hearing that sometimes having too much of a good thing is not always ideal as some have been struggling to get out into the paddocks for spraying.

The volume of rainfall and subsequent run off from the surrounding paddocks did cause some disruption on the local roads, as we found out ourselves when tried to get to Narrogin in our traffic car. We came across a large amount of water on the road, and we were unsure of the depth, and flow of the water. We decided to make a U turn and change our route.

These conditions often lead people to take unnecessary risks, as they are running late, just want to get home, or for some other reason, they think that their car turns in to a boat.

This week we had the unpleasant task of having to assist our colleagues in Wagin. We assisted in the search for a missing car driver who was one of those who took an unnecessary risk, and sadly lost his life. Although we can't comment too much

about the incident as a sign of respect for the family, it is a timely reminder to always drive to the conditions presented to you, the vehicle you are driving, and your experience as a driver. If the road ahead of you appears dangerous, or you are not sure, or if there is a sign up saying 'Road Closed', please be sensible and turn around otherwise you could find yourself in a situation that can very quickly escalate into something out of your control.

Some local roads are still affected, so please be vigilant out there, the MAIN ROADS website has some useful information regarding road closures.



TRAFFIC

It has been a fairly steady period of road policing with some drivers obviously in a hurry, however they were not so keen after we had spoken to them. We are happy to say as usual most were not locals, so well done everyone.

Last week we had a few reports coming in for damaged cars as a result of loose gravel the Lake Grace-Pingrup Road. Unfortunately, as police, we are not able to assist with any damage reports from this. If you have been affected by this and have sustained damage, our suggestion would be to contact the main roads department to advise them, and see how they can assist you.

Hay growers encouraged to check crops for signs disease

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) is encouraging hay growers to check their crops for signs of *Septoria avenae* blotch, with the wet conditions providing the perfect environment for the disease to flourish. *Septoria avenae* blotch is the most prevalent oat hay disease in Western Australia and due to the increased rainfall this season, crops, particularly in lower rainfall regions, could be under greater disease pressure than previous years.

DPIRD plant pathologist Geoff Thomas said hay growers had already reported *Septoria avenae* this season, which wasn't uncommon, but the wet weather could pose an increased disease load.

"With all this rain, and if it continues, it's likely the disease pressure on crops could be higher than it has been for a couple of years," he said.

"Growers in low rainfall areas that don't normally use a fungicide may need to consider applying one, and those in the higher rainfall areas, could be using more than they had expected."

Research from the National Hay Agronomy (NHA) project funded by DPIRD and AgriFutures Export Fodder Program and carried out by DPIRD plant pathologist Kylie Chambers found *Septoria avenae* blotch was the primary disease detected in Western Australian oat crops for the past three years.

Septoria avenae blotch is a foliar fungal disease that can cause significant damage and affect the yield and quality of oaten hay.

Dr Chambers said most paddocks would have some level of *Septoria avenae* blotch this year.

"The fungus kills the green leaf and that affects how the plant is going to photosynthesize," she said.

"There's also discoloured or dead leaf material visible as part of the canopy and that will impact on quality.

"Growers should keep an eye out for oval or elliptical-shaped, dark-coloured lesions on the lower canopy of the crop, which can then develop through the canopy.

"Fungicides applied according to the label recommendations and before the disease has already done the damage, should be effective at managing the disease and also safe in terms of hay quality and residues."

Dr Chambers said continuous cropping of oats increased the risk of transferring *Septoria*

avenae blotch into the next season, as it was carried over on stubble.

"Rotating paddocks reduces the recurrence of the disease, while planting oat varieties with a higher tolerance also helps," she said.

The wetter seasonal conditions have provided an opportunity for NHA project researchers to assess the yield, effect on quality and the losses incurred from more severe levels of *Septoria avenae* blotch.

This year's trial has been established at Manjimup, an area susceptible to high levels of *Septoria avenae* blotch.

It includes several varieties with different levels of *Septoria avenae* resistance and various rates of fungicide application, as well as a treatment without fungicide.

Dr Chambers said the trial would assess how high levels of disease affected hay yield, what a grower would get paid for it in terms of the quality of the hay and what the exporter can get paid for it in terms of the export quality of the hay as well.

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GOLD at COOLGARDIE 1893.

(I'm not sure which weight measurement has been used here.) For those younger than me:
The difference is pounds and ounces. 1 oz = 28.35 gms. / 16oz to the lb / 1 pound = .4536 kg

The Great Depression 1929-1939.

The movement of prospectors and workers leaving Southern Cross after the strike and the mine closing down, were heading further East.

News of Bayley & Ford's find at Fly Flat(Coolgardie) as well Paddy Hannan registering the mine at Kalgoorlie 17TH June 1893, very quickly saw a rush.

Bayley and Ford panned out 2,500 ozs of gold in nine months, they then sold their claim to the Browne-Lyon Syndicate, who dollied 9,000 ounces from less than 5 ton of stone. Later they successfully dollied 21,500 ounces from 40 ton of stone, in under nine months.

Neither Bayley & Ford or the Browne-Lyon Syndicate had in use machinery or battery.

That mine was later floated on the Stock Exchange, however it failed to continue to produce, however other mines were successful.

WATER: Soaks and wells were enlarged by Government contractors, or condensing plants were set up, each had a caretaker.

Condensing Plants produced 100,000 gallons of water from 120,000 gallons of salt water each day. These plants were huge, one of the biggest in Coolgardie, its angled cooling-towers ranging the skyline like some modern rocket-launching site.

Cost: Water varied from 20 cent/ 5 litres to 50 cents/ 5 litres. To water horse or camel \$2 /head per day. This varied higher at times.

These were depression times.

Prospectors came from the Eastern States travelling by boat to Albany, then they travelled by train to York and Northam and Southern Cross then by any possible means to the goldfields, or to Broomehill and using Holland's Track to Coolgardie, saving time and money.

600 horse teams as well as camel trains of forty or fifty animals bringing stores, heavy machinery, boilers and condensers were on the track to Coolgardie and Kalgoorlie from York or Southern Cross. Cobb and Co coaches were shipped over from Victoria and were used until 1886, when the railway was extended from Southern Cross.

By 1898, with the railway through, Coolgardie was the third largest town in the State, only Perth and Fremantle were larger.

There were two Stock Exchanges, an "open call" market, and 25 stockbrokers.

There were twenty six hotels- sixteen of them in Bayley Street and three breweries.

The wealth for W.A. Gold production 1892 = \$452,000, 1894 = \$1,574,000.

By 1899 Coolgardie and Kalgoorlie had increased the W.A annual gold production to = \$12,400,000. Seven years had seen a huge growth in population and wealth to the fledgling State.

THE HOLTERMAN NUGGET.

The Bayers and Holterman nugget, found October 1872 at Hill End N.S.W. was not really a nugget but a piece of gold detached from a reef. It was the world's largest single specimen of gold.

It measured 4 foot 9 inches, was 2 foot wide, averaging 4 inches thick, and weighed 10,080 ozs.

Unfortunately their mine only yielded another 155.7oz more of gold.



From the CEO

After what has seemed like months of rain, it has been great to see some sunshine at last over the past week or so. With the rain stopping for a while we will be inspecting all roads for any damage caused by local flooding and where possible will be seeking support from Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFWA) which may be available for local governments potentially impacted by the recent severe weather events.

When we received the funding to clean out the Lake Biddy dams and tidy up the catchment there was no way that we thought that it would fill up this year, we thought it would take at least a year or two. Judge for yourselves at the result of some impeccable timing by all those involved.



At the Ordinary Council Meeting of Wednesday 28 July 2021, resolutions were made for the following;

1. AA Dam 190 James Dam—Council supported the proposed entry into the State Register of Heritage Places provided that that the registration will have no restrictions on the continued negotiations with the neighbouring land owners for the use of the water
2. The Lake Grace Development Association Inc. sought in-principle support to install a recycled corrugated iron fence along the railway reserve north of Stubbs Street from behind “the Shed” down to Farmers Centre. Council supported the proposal subject to approval by ARC Infrastructure and the Public Transport Authority as well as the LGDA providing full details of project.
3. The Public Sector Commissioner now requires all public sector agencies, (the Shire of Lake Grace is bound by some of the same rules) employees and elected members to undergo mandatory Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultural awareness training. The training resource was developed by the

Aboriginal Advisory Council of WA which includes historical and contemporary information with sections on family, education, country and work.

4. The Ordinary Council Meeting scheduled for Wednesday 22 September 2021 has now been changed to Wednesday 29 September 2021 because of the WALGA Convention. Confirmation of this meeting date will be published on the website and Facebook as well as the coming Community News.

5. Council has endorsed the new Code of Conduct for Employees which complies with the revised Local Government Act 1995. The Code of Conduct is now published on the website.

6. Council endorsed the recently completed Regulation 17 Audit review which examines the effectiveness of the Shire’s systems and procedures pursuant to Regulation 17 of the Local Government (Audit) Regulations.

7. The 2021/2022 Shire of Lake Grace budget was adopted pursuant to Local Government Act 1995. Copy of the budget is available at the Reception and is also published on the website.

8. Council endorsed the review of the Shire of Lake Grace Disability Access and Inclusion Plan (DAIP) Progress Report as presented.

The response to the workforce survey has been overwhelming with some good suggestions coming in.

If you have not done so yet, there is still some time to return the survey responses.

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Rice Bubbles with Honey Slice

Serves 12

- 125 grams butter
- 3 tablespoons honey
- 4 cups puffed rice cereal 120 grams
- ½ cup desiccated coconut 40 grams



METHOD

1. Line an 18 x 28cm slice tin with baking paper, making sure to leave plenty of paper hanging over the sides to help you remove the slice once it has set.
2. Place the honey and butter together in a large saucepan and bring to a slow boil. Cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.
3. Add the puffed rice cereal and coconut to the saucepan and mix to combine.
4. Transfer the mixture to your prepared slice tin and press the slice down with the back of a spoon to flatten it. Place the slice into the fridge for 2 hours to firm.

Cut into pieces to serve.

THERMOMIX METHOD

1. Line an 18 x 28cm slice tin with baking paper, making sure to leave plenty of paper hanging over the sides to help you remove the slice once it has set.
2. Place the honey and butter (which has been cut into cubes) into your Thermomix bowl and cook for 3 minutes, 70 degrees, speed 2. If the butter hasn't quite melted (this can happen depending on the temperature of the butter to begin with), cook for a further 1 minute, 70 degrees, speed 2.
3. Add the rice bubbles and coconut and mix for 5 seconds, speed 4, REVERSE.
4. Scrape down the sides of the bowl and mix for a further 3 seconds, speed 4, REVERSE to combine.
5. Transfer the mixture to your prepared slice tin and press the slice down with the back of a spoon to flatten it. Place the slice into the fridge for 2 hours to firm and then cut into pieces.
