

Supermoons and Minimoons

The Moon's orbit around Earth is slightly oval shaped or elliptical. So, every month there's a time when the Moon is at its closest distance to Earth at about 363,300 kilometres away, known as perigee and another time when it is at its furthest distance from Earth at about 405,500 kilometres away and known as apogee.

When perigee coincides with the full Moon, it's popularly called a "Supermoon". And when the full Moon coincides with apogee? Well, it's a "Micromoon" or a "Minimoon"!

When the Moon is at its closest it will appear 17 percent bigger and 30 percent brighter than a Minimoon. You can spot a Minimoon on the 19th November. Looking to the east, moonrise will occur at 7.06pm and on this night the moon will be furthest away from Earth in its orbit. Check it out to see if you think the Moon looks smaller than normal.

Tarin Rock Junior Tennis Tournament


Parking space was at a premium at Tarin Rock Tennis Club on Saturday as the club hosted its biggest Junior Tournament in years.

At Munglinup you will find beautiful pristine beaches with lagoons and the Munglinup Reef plus lots of rock areas with rock pools where you can find abalone. On the beaches you can catch salmon skippy, herring, salmon trout and gummy shark while at the Oldfield River/Estuary you can catch bream and mullet. Munglinup is roughly 2 hours and 20 minutes from Newdegate. On your way to Munglinup you will go through Lake King and Ravensthorpe, I recommend stopping at Lake King Tavern for some lunch on the way.



- All winners will be notified by phone, as well as being announced on Newdegate CRC social media

Conduct of Entrants and Risk

- Safety and security aspects of the lighting display are the sole responsibility of the entrant.
- Entrants must take into consideration their local environment and neighbours; and must ensure their displays represent no danger to the general public. In addition, consideration must be given to noise and the levels of light emitted by their displays.
- Entrants must comply with all Council regulation and by-laws.

Sustainability and resilience focus of WA Horticulture Update 2021

Sustainability, resilience and the future of the Western Australia's horticulture sector will be the focus of the State's premier industry conference to be held in Perth early next month.

The WA Horticulture Update 2021, hosted by the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) and supported by Hort Innovation and Business Events Perth, will showcase the latest in business development and research innovations.

A complementary, bespoke tour will be held the following day, starting with a breakfast at the Perth Markets before visiting a bioenergy plant, black soldier fly research, a leading avocado property and the State's largest nursery.

DPIRD horticulture and irrigated agriculture director Rohan Prince said the conference was a great opportunity for all those involved in the industry to get an insight into the rapidly changing global food production landscape.




Newdegate Public Library book of the week.

LOCAL NEWS

We have had a busy couple of weeks here in Lake Grace and Newdegate, dealing with a variation of incidents, and there were a few late-night call outs for the officers of Lake Grace. This is part of the joys of country policing, and we often have to accommodate the hours to suit the town. Nothing too serious, and all has successfully been dealt with.

DOGS

We have had reports of dogs wandering the street. Although this does not directly fall in to police responsibility, we will become involved if the dog bites a person. If you seen a stray dog that is becoming a nuisance, the best place to report this would be through the shire, who can then contact the local ranger. If your dog is impounded, it will cost you money to get it released, and if your dog attacks another dog, you can end up with a hefty fine.

Dog Act 1976.

Control of Dogs Generally.

Section 30 of the Dog Act specifies that a dog must not be in a public area unless it is wearing a collar to which is securely attached a registration tag.

If a dog is at any time in a public place without a collar and tag, every person liable for the control of the dog commits an offence and could face a fine of up to \$5000.

If a dog attacks or chases any person or animal and physical injury is caused to the person or animal that is attacked or chased, every person liable for the control of the dog commits an offence and could face a fine ranging from \$1000 up to \$20,000.

If the dog attacks or chases any person or animal without causing physical injury every person liable for the control of the dog could face a fine ranging from \$500 to \$10,000.

A magistrate may also order for the destruction of the dog if it attacks any person.

Make sure your garden is secured, and your dog kept in the garden.

CRIME

This week we have had a concerning fraud reported to us. A phishing scam has seen two of our local businesses effected, and at a loss financially.

A quick summary of the offence is as follows:

Business sends an invoice with correct details requesting funds.

Receiver received the invoice, however somewhere in between, fraudulent activity has occurred, whereby the e-mail sent was intercepted, changed to provide alternative bank details, then sent on to the receiver.

The invoice was paid, however to the incorrect bank details provided.

After investigation, this is actually a very common scam, it usually occurs when someone's computer has been hacked, by clicking on a strange link, or entering details in to certain websites. A lot of the time if your computer has been hacked, you will not be aware.

If something doesn't seem right, it usually isn't.

If you are asked to change bank details, then confirm with the person directly, that this is a genuine request.

I am currently gathering some information from other police sources, and will have this ready for

the next issue of the Lakes Links and Gate Post in relation to cyber safety and how to keep you personal and business safe.

TRAFFIC

Police this week have been made aware people driving without lights. Although it is not a requirement, it is definitely recommended that lights are used whilst in the country regardless of time of day, or amount of visibility.

Farm vehicles are especially encouraged to use their lights, with harvest quickly approaching, there will be a lot more traffic from farmers on our roads. Going from paddock to paddock, sometimes the mentality is that 'I'm just nipping across the road', that may be the case, but farm vehicles drive at a very low speed in comparison to cars, and having lights on at all times would make them more visible to other drivers, and therefor become safer on our roads.

This has previously been mentioned, however it appears that motorists still don't know the laws in relation to this....

'SLOWMO'

Did you know 'SLOWMO' laws apply to all vehicles with a flashing light

'Slow Down, Move Over' means motorists must slow down to 40km/h when passing vehicles with flashing lights.

The laws also apply to vehicles responding to an incident on the road or roadside.

This is to protect all personnel who work on the roads.

Drivers need to slow-down when passing RAC breakdown crews, tow trucks, Main Roads incident respondent vehicles and all emergency services.

The key about this is, if they see a vehicle of this nature, it means there are people walking around those vehicles. They are people completely unprotected, apart from the vehicle's lights.

40km/h is an impact speed that there is a possibility the person could survive...that is one of the reasons they've gone for a specific speed.

Grain Brokers Weekly Market Report

Mexican grain imports increasing, but so too is food inflation ...

Mexico has been on a big grain buying spree in recent weeks, booking up substantial volumes of wheat and corn out of the United States as the country continues to increase its grain imports and dependence on foreign countries to meet growing domestic demand.

In the week to September 30, Mexico purchased 801,400 metric tonne of corn from the US. Mexico was the biggest purchaser, securing almost 64 per cent of total US sales for that week. Wheat acquisitions for the same week were 89,100 metric tonne, with Mexico again the biggest customer with almost 27 per cent of total sales. Mexico also took top billing in the rice stakes, booking 38,200 metric tonne from the US, or 52 per cent of the week's trades.

The strong purchasing pattern continued in the week to October 7, with the USDA reporting corn sales to Mexico at 790,20 metric tonne, or 76 per cent of the week's reported US corn business. Wheat transactions were higher than the previous week at 127,800 metric tonne, second to the Philippines on the total US sales listing. Weekly US rice sales were 33,900 metric tonne, with Mexico scooping up 87 per cent or 29,600 metric tonne.

The United States is expected to remain the principal supplier of grains to Mexico in the 2021/22 marketing year due to logistical advantages and a long history of bilateral trade. That said, Mexico has expanded its sources in recent years as major producers actively seek to challenge Uncle Sam's market dominance into its southern neighbour.

In a recent report from Mexico's National Agricultural Council, it was revealed 65 per cent of the nation's domestic wheat consumption in 2020 was imported compared to 55 per cent in 2006. Over the same 15-year period, the proportion of corn demand met by imports increased from 26 per cent to 37 per cent. For rice, the ratio rose from 70 per cent in 2006 to 83 per cent last year.

The increased imports come despite a concerted government incentivisation scheme to encourage small farmers to increase the production of basic grains such as wheat and rice. While these schemes are slowly having the desired outcome, the increase in output is much slower than the burgeoning demand.

In the September grain and feed update from the USDA's Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS), Mexico's wheat production was increased by 0.2 million metric tonne to 3.2MMT compared to their May estimate on the back of favourable seasonal conditions. This is 0.1MMT higher than the official USDA estimate and 0.235MMT, or 8 per cent higher than the 2020/21 crop. However, it is still 1MMT lower than the record crop of 4.2MMT in the 2008/09 season.

Wheat is deemed the second most essential cereal in the Mexican diet. It represents 40 per cent of total household expenditure on cereals and provides around 10 per cent of the total calories in the Mexican diet. Primarily driven by population growth, wheat demand for human, seed and industrial use is forecast to increase by 1.4 per cent to 7.1MMT in 2021/22 compared to the previous marketing year.

Demand for wheat from the stock feed sector is forecast to increase by 50 per cent to 300,000 metric tonne. While relatively small compared to the demand for human consumption, the increase does reflect a higher inclusion rate in animal rations, particularly for the pork sector, at the expense of corn.

Relatively low carry-in stocks and the higher demand has pushed projected wheat imports up to 5.1MMT, 8 per cent higher than in 2020/21, but still 5.3 per cent shy of the record 5.37MMT imported in 2016/17. At 3.46MMT, Mexico was the largest market for US wheat in the 2020/21 season, just ahead of China on 3.21MMT.

On the corn front, the September FAS update is calling 2021/22 production unchanged from its May report at a record 28MMT, up 1MMT on its previous 2021/22 estimate. However, the 2020/21 production number was revised higher by 0.2MMT to 27.2MMT based on more complete data from the Secretariat of Agriculture and Rural Development (SADER). The planted area is up 2.2 per cent to 7.3 million hectares.

Harvest of this year's corn crop is ahead of average, with yields to date a bit better than expected, especially given the dry conditions in the Northern Plains this growing season. As of October 8, around 41 per cent of the crop had been harvested, compared to 29 per cent at the same time last year and a long-term average of 31 per cent.

The Mexican diet is heavily reliant on corn-based foods such as tortillas. Corn accounts for a significant proportion of the population's daily caloric intake, a custom that emerged thousands of years ago. That is why corn is considered as much a food grain as it is a feed grain to Mexicans.

Domestic demand for corn is forecast at 44.2MMT in 2021/22, an increase of 0.5MMT compared to the previous corresponding period. The food consumption component is unchanged at 18.2MMT or 41 per cent of total demand. Feed demand makes up the balance at 26MMT, up 0.5MMT on the 2020/21 figure, matching the growth and bullish outlook for the stockfeed demand, particularly from the poultry sector.

This has pushed projected imports up to a new benchmark of 17MMT, 3 per cent or 0.5MMT higher year-on-year, with the trend expected to continue while production increases lag the demand curve. Mexico held the mantle as the globe's biggest corn importer until usurped by China in the 2020/21 marketing year.

The current high priced commodity environment is great for the Mexican farmer, but the increased reliance on imports makes food inflation a massive challenge for the government. In September 2021 alone, the cost of food in Mexico increased by 8.8 per cent compared to September last year.

The price of tortillas is a significant economic barometer for the Mexican economy, and the high cost of imports has the government considering the relaxation of duties on imported corn. Such a move would go a long way toward appeasing unrest amongst the general population as the economy struggles to recover from the COVID-19 downturn.



Newdegate Country Club

The Newdegate Country Club Extension and Renovations project is well underway with much planning and ordering of supplies occurring behind the scenes. There have been some delays due to the chronic shortage or unavailability of some trades and materials as a result of unprecedented demand right across Australia, not just our neck of the woods.

Works completed so far include stripping of the kitchen, removal of the old office area, removal of the ceiling, raising of the floor in front of the bar area and removal of the somewhat controversial brick pillar. In addition, the toilets have been stripped in preparation for the new toilets and kids room/meeting room area. The concrete has been poured for the new toilet and kitchen areas and the floors in the old toilet areas. All frameworks for the extensions have been fabricated onsite ready to go up once the concrete has cured. Colour selections have been made for the new carpet area, tiles in the toilets as well as the colorbond sheeting to replace the old asbestos areas in the roof. The planning for the fit-out to the kitchen is underway with stainless benches being sourced and appliances being arranged.



All Abilities Playground

The All Abilities Playground in Lake Grace has seen groundwork preparation commenced over the past few weeks. The suppliers of the equipment have made their site visit and final details are being settled. The shelters and bbq's have been ordered and are on their way. Additional fundraising by the committee is continuing with excellent results so far.

Several other projects are underway across the entire Shire however, as mentioned above the shortage of tradies and materials is proving most difficult. For example, we have ordered several shade shelters and toilet buildings and the lead time for these in some cases is 14 weeks which is most frustrating.

AN IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL PROPERTY OWNERS BOTH RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL

A recent drive-by carried out by the Shire of Lake Grace Community Emergency Services Manager has indicated that many properties in the town-sites of Lake Grace, Newdegate, Lake King and Varley currently do not conform to the requirements of Section 33 of the Bush Fire Act 1954 in that the fuel loads on the properties are excessive due to overgrown weeds, trees and in some cases an accumulation of rubbish.

Your attention is brought to the Shire of Lake Grace Fire Management Notice that accompanied your 2021/2022 Shire Rates notices which outlines the requirements of the Act. If you do not have a copy of the Notice you may obtain a copy from the Shire Administration Office on request. The fire mitigation measures must be in place by 1 November 2021 and be maintained up to 30 April 2022.

Your co-operation in tidying up your properties by the due date is sought to not only provide a safeguard to your property but also to your neighbours. It also has the added benefit of making the entire town more presentable.

There will be a further inspection of all town-site properties carried out after the 1 November to check on the compliance to this request. It is worth noting that penalties of up to \$5,000 may apply for breaches of the conditions of the Bush Fire Act 1954.

- We are asking that all farm responders and permanent workers register as a member in the Farmer Response 'brigade' where you live.
- You only need to be registered in 1 area, preferably where you live.
- Registration is free and allows the Shire to provide training and PPE as funding allows.

Go to the Shire website www.lakegrace.wa.gov.au/ for the registration form and send to shire@lakegrace.wa.gov.au Once registered, you are able to attend training and be eligible for fire PPC. We look forward to having you registered and supporting your community this summer.

As your Shire, we want to ensure we are providing local access to training and safe systems of work at emergency incidents, as is required. We believe that being registered, undertaking training, wearing appropriate clothing and keeping your fire unit(s) well maintained, will demonstrate that you are taking 'reasonable steps' to keep yourself and others safe.

For transient and short-term workers, we encourage you to provide appropriate training and induction materials relevant to your farm or business and seriously consider leaving these workers behind if you respond to fires in neighbouring properties for their safety and our shared liability. We will not have the capability or resources to train and equip transient and short-term workers.

We acknowledge that it is highly unlikely that we will be able to deliver training before the start of harvest and will work with registered members to deliver the courses as soon as practicable.

Please Note: There is no kerbside recycling collection service in Lake King or Varley.

The recycling bins are collected by Warren Blackwood Waste and transported to a recycling facility. If items which are not recyclable are found the content can't be recycled and the load will be directed to the landfill.

If an item is covered in food, it is not recyclable. Food is one of the worst contaminators in the recycling process. By using the yellow top recycling bin correctly you are contributing, in a combined community effort, to reduce the amount of rubbish that is directed to landfill facilities each year.

Haystack Creatures

A fun easy recipe to do with the kids to get you in the Halloween spirit.



INGREDIENTS

- 140g thin crunchy noodles
- 225g bittersweet chocolate, finely chopped
- 1/2 c. vanilla icing, tinted desired colours
- Candy eyes or jelly beans
- Toasted coconut, for serving

METHOD:

1. Line a large baking pan with baking paper.
2. Melt chocolate in microwave according to package directions
3. Place noodles in a large bowl, pour chocolate over top and gently toss until noodles are evenly coated
4. Drop 10 heaping spoonful's (about 1/4 cup each) onto prepared baking sheet. Refrigerate until firm, 20 to 30 minutes.
5. Transfer icing to a resealable plastic bag/ piping bag. Snip off a tiny corner and use as glue to stick the eyes on creatures, then pipe on an additional pupil. Serve on toasted coconut, if desired.


